Have you paid your Fun Théâtre Membership fee?

After our first AGM in 2019 we introduced membership fees for the first time. These are set at $20\mathfrak{E}$ a year, with Junior membership for $2\mathfrak{E}$ a year.

In practice, we have not called for subscriptions every year. Membership is an important part of FTC. As well as helping to finance our activities, it acts as a form of administrative tool, helping us to keep track of our members. Payment of subscriptions also gives members an opportunity to confirm their commitment to the association.

Although finance is an essential part of maintaining our association, as it is for all associations, we have tried to not allow it to be a defining part of FTC. Hence, we have been quite lenient in our approach, and have not made the collection of fees from late payers a priority. However, in the interests of maintaining a well-run and properly administered association we intend to implement a somewhat stricter regime in future.

Bonjour Tout le Monde – a Letter from Graham

I am so pleased to be writing this. I have always said that, although I contribute very little to its production, I am extremely proud of our Fun Théâtre Bulletin. It was Cathy's inspired idea that brought it into being, and it is she who creates and publishes every edition. Circumstances have conspired to prevent her from producing one for some months, but as I write this, I know that edition 07 will be dropping into all of our in boxes very soon, and I am so looking forward to reading it.

That's one of the huge rewards of being the President of an association like Fun Théâtre. Other people achieve great things, and I get to be proud of the result. For example, over 70 people came together to put Cinderella on stage in March last year: building sets; creating soundscapes and lighting-scapes; making costumes; making music; acting; dancing; choreographing and directing; making videos - and so much more. Around 20 people performed in three sketches for the Téléthon that year, and over 40 people made up the team that brought 1001 Nights to the stage in March this year. Okay, I contributed to each one of those too, but as President of this wonderful association I get to be proud of all of that - of all of you. Thank you.

I don't want to give away the whole programme for our open evening on 11th July, but we will be taking a brief look back at some of these past achievements, and what we have achieved together since Fun Théâtre was created. But, perhaps more importantly, we will be looking to the future too. We would like to contribute to the Passais Villages Téléthon event again this year, and we will be sharing our ideas for that with you. I am sure everybody is keenly awaiting news of our plans for the promised pantomime in 2025, and I don't think you will be disappointed. At the end of the evening, you will be able to sign up to participate in one or both events. And we may look briefly beyond that - who knows?

Talking of the future, it's important that we take care of that if we want Fun Théâtre to continue. When the association was created in 2018 the bureau consisted of just two officers: president and treasurer. We have gradually increased this to the current five, and now we are making plans to increase that to the six that our statutes allow. Our membership has grown since we first formed the association. People come and go of course, but mostly they stay, and the net result has been a continuous growth in membership, and we have been very lucky in attracting new talent into the team. I am particularly pleased to have seen more young people join us, and our FTC Académie programme is helping us make the most of them. (Spoiler alert! They will be providing most of the entertainment for us on the 11th). But we need to keep building and refreshing our bureau too. Please consider standing for election yourself. I am sure that some of us will be very happy to step aside and let new blood take over some of the reins.

Fun Théâtre Communautaire Association Secretary

We are hoping to expand and improve the bureau that steers Fun Théâtre to better reflect our growing membership. So, we are looking for a new person to join the existing members of the bureau and take on the role of association secretary.

The responsibilities will include:

- Welcoming new members and visitors to Fun Théâtre
- > Supporting meetings by taking minutes and circulating agendas
- Dealing with correspondence and keeping other bureau members updated about FTC activity

To be an effective association secretary you will be someone who can organize meetings and activities. If you are a person who has a great eye for detail and can work in a methodical way to support Fun Théâtre activity, then this might be a good role for you. You will need good communication skills and enjoy meeting new people. An association secretary needs to be IT literate and have good administrative and record keeping skills.

Téléthon 2023

Held every December throughout France, the Téléthon encourages Associations from all over the country to raise money for a children's charity specialising rare diseases.

For their part Passais Village organised a dinner which was a sell out. FTC eagerly agreed to provide entertainment and Graham began to research something suitable. He invited members to come to a presentation of a film of three comedy sketches he had found and then volunteer to be in one or two of them.

Incredibly, the sketches did not involve any speaking, purely actions. Everyone realised that although there were no lines to memorise, the exact timing of their movements were vital and one false move could result in the failure or the whole routine!

A program of rehearsals began and both Graham and Jae started directing in earnest. At the same time Martin Minshall began creating the necessary scenery and props.

The first sketch was very technical and each person demonstrated a given job role, coming on stage one after the other and interconnecting their actions.

The cinema routine came next which was simpler and involved participants miming messages along a row of seats.

The synchronised swimming routine was the third, and ultimately the funniest, as the set was made to look like a swimming pool. The team were diving around behind a half curtain on large soft mats and suitably attired in swimming outfits.

On the night, everyone waited anxiously to start, but the diners took ages to take their seats and start their dinner.

Eventually, the first sketch was completed and undoubtedly the audience were amazed at watching such entertainment.

The cinema sketch did not command the same attention, despite being funny but the synchronised swimming was given great applause.

The effort FTC had put into their involvement was really appreciated by all concerned and yet again we made our mark in the life of the commune.

Also, all involved with this FTC production need praising for providing their time and energy which ultimately helped an excellent cause.

Amazing memories from Cenrillon / Cinderella

Well, March 2023 might feel like lightyears away now but...what an amazing show we put on! As Graham has mentioned elsewhere more than 70 people came together to entertain and delight our audiences. The wonderful programme is a testament to everyone who participated. I, for one, had a ball taking on the two roles of Boss Bob and Mary Berry for my very first experience of being in a pantomime. There were other first timers on stage, as well as seasoned performers, and also our Fun Théâtre Juniors taking on the role of mice in Baron Fauché's household. Then the very productive collaborations with two local dancing schools: Gorron Danse and Danse Moderne Domfront added so much to the overall look of the performances. And, of course, our live band under Chris's guidance was fantastique. For me, personally, the stand out performance was that of Tamzin French in the role of Cendrillon/Cinderella. She was serenely beautiful in her portrayal of the eponymous lead character, and impressively professional at all rehearsals (on top of getting up before 06h00 everyday to travel to Lycee!). But there were many, many other excellent renditions of Graham's brilliant characters — who can forget the ugly sisters? Shakespeare? The Bobs? The Witches (my granddaughter's favourite by far)? Etc etc etc...so many great performances!!!! Graham and Jae take great credit for bringing all the personalities to life and the thanks of all the cast go to them for their vision.

But it really does need stating that there are so many people behind the scenes, and the panto would have been nothing without them. These roles can be relatively unsung and go unnoticed but are absolutely crucial to the success of the project. We at Fun Théâtre appreciate all of them. Rosa did an incredible job with the costumes. Sian made a calm and kind presence in the green room. Polly and her team were amazing running the box office and managing front of house. The scenery was fabulous, but would have been nothing without the team working with Martin to change the sets with such speed and efficiency. Peter and Ian set up and ran the lighting and sound, from scratch, to a srandard that many an amateur theatre company would envy. And so many of Fun Théâtre's members were there after the final performance helping to clear and clean the salle ready to return it to the commune in the pristine condition that we received it. And that is the best thing for me...nobody way too important to muck in and help. That is the spirit of Fun Théâtre and I am really, really looking forward to finding out all about Panto 2025 as I can't wait to do it all again (even the clearing up at then end!!!!).
